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9 SYNOPSIS: This bill makes supplemental appropriations
10 from the Education Trust Fund Advancement and
11 Technology Fund for the fiscal year ending
12 September 30, 2020; to the public institutions of
13 higher education in the amount of \$65,911,419; and
14 to the Department of Education, the Board of
15 Trustees of the Alabama Institute for Deaf and
16 Blind, the Board of Youth Services School
17 Districts, the Board of Directors of the Alabama
18 School of Fine Arts, and the Board of Trustees of
19 the Alabama School of Math and Science in the
20 amount of \$177,934,009; and makes a transfer from
21 the Education Trust Fund Advancement and Technology
22 Fund to the Education Trust Fund in the amount of
23 \$15,000,000 at the end of the fiscal year ending
24 September 30, 2020 to reimburse the Education Trust
25 Fund for the estimated first year debt service of
26 the Public School and College Authority bond issue

1 contemplated by Senate Bill 242 of the 2020 Regular

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8 To make supplemental appropriations from the
9 Education Trust Fund Advancement and Technology Fund for the
10 fiscal year ending September 30, 2020, to the public
11 institutions of higher education in the amount of \$65,911,419,
12 and to the Department of Education, the Board of Trustees of
13 the Alabama Institute for Deaf and Blind, the Board of Youth
14 Services School Districts, the Board of Directors of the
15 Alabama School of Fine Arts, and the Board of Trustees of the
16 Alabama School of Math and Science in the amount of
17 \$177,934,009; and to make a transfer from the Education Trust
18 Fund Advancement and Technology Fund to the Education Trust
19 Fund in the amount of \$15,000,000 at the end of the fiscal
20 year ending September 30, 2020 as reimbursement for the
21 estimated first year debt service expenses of the Public
22 School and College Authority bond issue contemplated by Senate
23 Bill 242 of the 2020 Regular Session.

24 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

25 Section 1. In addition to all other appropriations
26 heretofore or hereafter made, there is hereby appropriated a
27 total of \$65,911,419 from the Education Trust Fund Advancement

1 and Technology Fund to the public institutions of higher edu-
2 cation for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2020. This
3 appropriation shall be expended as provided in Section 29-9-4,
4 Code of Alabama 1975. This appropriation shall be distributed
5 as follows:

1 Section 2. In addition to all other appropriations
2 heretofore or hereafter made, there is hereby appropriated a
3 total of \$177,934,009 from the Education Trust Fund
4 Advancement and Technology Fund to the Department of
5 Education, the Board of Trustees of the Alabama Institute for
6 Deaf and Blind, the Board of Youth Services School Districts,
7 the Board of Directors of the Alabama School of Fine Arts, and
8 the Board of Trustees of the Alabama School of Math and
9 Science for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2020. This
10 appropriation shall be expended as provided in Section 29-9-4,
11 Code of Alabama 1975.

13 locate the funds appropriated herein to the local boards of

11 (b) Notwithstanding any other laws to the contrary,
12 the funds appropriated to the Department of Education by
13 subsection (a) of this section shall not be expended without
14 prior approval of the State Superintendent of Education.

15 (c)(1) The above appropriation for teacher
16 professional development shall be allocated to the Alabama
17 Department of Education to be distributed to the Ed Farm
18 Classroom of Tomorrow. These funds will be used by Ed Farm to
19 provide technology tools and professional development services
20 to classroom teachers in an effort to improve instruction and
21 student learning gains. It is the intent of the legislature
22 that in addition to general programmatic costs, Ed Farm may
23 also expend funds for software, hardware, administrative costs
24 and professional learning services.

1 (2) The State Superintendent shall provide a report
2 of the initiative to the Chair of the House Ways and
3 Means-Education Committee and the Chair of the Senate
4 Committee on Finance and Taxation-Education no later than
5 October 1, 2021.

6 Section 4. Notwithstanding any other provision of
7 law, in addition to the allowable expenses from the Education
8 Trust Fund Advancement and Technology Fund provided in Section
9 29-9-4, Code of Alabama 1975, there is hereby transferred
10 \$15,000,000 from the Education Trust Fund Advancement and
11 Technology Fund to the Education Trust Fund at the end of the
12 fiscal year ending September 30, 2020 to reimburse the
13 Education Trust Fund for the first-year cost of the Public
14 School and College Authority bond issue proposed by Senate
15 Bill 242 of the 2020 Regular Session or similar legislation
16 allocating bond proceeds to both public schools and
17 institutions of higher education in the state.

18 Section 5. All funds not expended in the current
19 fiscal year shall not revert but be carried forward for the
20 purpose appropriated.

21 Section 6. This act shall become effective
22 immediately upon its passage and approval by the Governor, or
23 upon its otherwise becoming law.
