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8 SYNOPSIS: This bill makes a supplemental appropriation  
9 from the Education Trust Fund Advancement and  
10 Technology Fund for the fiscal year ending  
11 September 30, 2020; to the public institutions of  
12 higher education in the amount of \$138,641,085; and  
13 to the Department of Education, the Board of  
14 Trustees of the Alabama Institute for Deaf and  
15 Blind, the Board of Youth Services School  
16 Districts, the Board of Directors of the Alabama  
17 School of Fine Arts, and the Board of Trustees of  
18 the Alabama School of Math and Science in the  
19 amount of \$374,274,507 for the fiscal year ending  
20 September 30, 2020.

23 TO BE ENTITLED

26 To make a supplemental appropriation from the  
27 Education Trust Fund Advancement and Technology Fund for the

1 fiscal year ending September 30, 2020, to the public  
2 institutions of higher education in the amount of  
3 \$138,641,085, and to the Department of Education, the Board of  
4 Trustees of the Alabama Institute for Deaf and Blind, the  
5 Board of Youth Services School Districts, the Board of  
6 Directors of the Alabama School of Fine Arts, and the Board of  
7 Trustees of the Alabama School of Math and Science in the  
8 amount of \$374,274,507 for the fiscal year ending September  
9 30, 2020.

10 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

11 Section 1. In addition to all other appropriations  
12 heretofore or hereafter made, there is hereby appropriated a  
13 total of \$138,641,085 from the Education Trust Fund Advance-  
14 ment and Technology Fund to the public institutions of higher  
15 education for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2020. This  
16 appropriation shall be expended as provided in Section 29-9-4,  
17 Code of Alabama 1975. This appropriation shall be distributed  
18 as follows:

12                   Section 2. In addition to all other appropriations  
13 heretofore or hereafter made, there is hereby appropriated a  
14 total of \$374,274,507 from the Education Trust Fund  
15 Advancement and Technology Fund to the Department of  
16 Education, the Board of Trustees of the Alabama Institute for  
17 Deaf and Blind, the Board of Youth Services School Districts,  
18 the Board of Directors of the Alabama School of Fine Arts, and  
19 the Board of Trustees of the Alabama School of Math and  
20 Science for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2020. This  
21 appropriation shall be expended as provided in Section 29-9-4,  
22 Code of Alabama 1975.

1                   Section 3. (a) The Department of Education shall al-  
2 locate the funds appropriated herein to the local boards of  
3 education and entities as follows:

1           (b) Notwithstanding any other laws to the contrary,  
2 the funds appropriated to the Department of Education by  
3 subsection (a) of this section shall not be expended without  
4 prior approval of the State Superintendent of Education.

5           (c) The above appropriation for teacher professional  
6 development shall be used to provide technology tools and  
7 professional development services to classroom teachers in an  
8 effort to improve instruction and student learning gains.  
9 Funds shall be allocated to the Alabama Department of  
10 Education to support the Digital Tools for Teachers  
11 Initiative. The Department shall allocate funds through a  
12 grant for local education agencies that will serve an equal  
13 number of teachers per school system through the provision of  
14 a technology tools package. It is the intent of the  
15 legislature that the funds shall be expended only for a tools  
16 package that includes a laptop, wireless tablet, a projector  
17 and professional learning services. The Department shall make  
18 a determination as to which packages are approved for district  
19 purchases.

20           The State Superintendent shall provide a report of  
21 the initiative to the Chair of the House Ways and  
22 Means-Education Committee and the Chair of the Senate  
23 Committee on Finance and Taxation-Education no later than  
24 October 1, 2021.

1                   Section 4. All funds not expended in the current  
2                   fiscal year shall not revert but be carried forward for the  
3                   purpose appropriated.

4                   Section 5. This act shall become effective  
5                   immediately upon its passage and approval by the Governor, or  
6                   upon its otherwise becoming law.
