11 To make supplemental appropriations from the  
12 Education Trust Fund Advancement and Technology Fund for the  
13 fiscal year ending September 30, 2021, to the public  
14 institutions of higher education in the amount of \$76,336,095,  
15 and to the Department of Education, the Board of Trustees of  
16 the Alabama Institute for Deaf and Blind, the Board of Youth  
17 Services School Districts, the Board of Directors of the  
18 Alabama School of Fine Arts, and the Board of Trustees of the  
19 Alabama School of Math and Science in the amount of  
20 \$205,971,947.

21 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

22 Section 1. In addition to all other appropriations  
23 heretofore or hereafter made, there is hereby appropriated a  
24 total of \$76,336,095 from the Education Trust Fund Advancement  
25 and Technology Fund to the public institutions of higher edu-  
26 cation for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2021. This  
27 appropriation shall be expended as provided in Section 29-9-4,

1 Code of Alabama 1975. This appropriation shall be distributed

20 Section 2. In addition to all other appropriations  
21 heretofore or hereafter made, there is hereby appropriated a

1 total of \$205,971,947 from the Education Trust Fund  
2 Advancement and Technology Fund to the Department of  
3 Education, the Board of Trustees of the Alabama Institute for  
4 Deaf and Blind, the Board of Youth Services School Districts,  
5 the Board of Directors of the Alabama School of Fine Arts, and  
6 the Board of Trustees of the Alabama School of Math and  
7 Science for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2021. This  
8 appropriation shall be expended as provided in Section 29-9-4,  
9 Code of Alabama 1975.

10 Section 3. (a) The Department of Education shall  
11 allocate the funds appropriated herein to the local boards of  
12 education and entities as follows:

9 (b) Notwithstanding any other laws to the contrary,  
10 the funds appropriated to the Department of Education by  
11 subsection (a) of this section shall not be expended without  
12 prior approval of the State Superintendent of Education.

13 (c) (1) The above appropriation for teacher  
14 professional development shall be allocated to the Alabama  
15 Department of Education to be distributed to the Ed Farm  
16 Classroom of Tomorrow. These funds will be used by Ed Farm to  
17 provide technology tools and professional development services  
18 to classroom teachers in an effort to improve instruction and  
19 student learning gains. It is the intent of the legislature  
20 that in addition to general programmatic costs, Ed Farm may  
21 also expend funds for software, hardware, administrative costs  
22 and professional learning services.

23 (2) The State Superintendent shall provide a report  
24 of the initiative to the Chair of the House Ways and

1 Means-Education Committee and the Chair of the Senate  
2 Committee on Finance and Taxation-Education no later than  
3 October 1, 2022

4 Section 4. All funds not expended in the current  
5 fiscal year shall not revert but be carried forward for the  
6 purpose appropriated.

7 Section 5. This act shall become effective  
8 immediately upon its passage and approval by the Governor, or  
9 upon its otherwise becoming law.
